
We have also been running a campaign to **name our SECRET POWERS Dog mascot** and will be able to let everyone know by our next newsletter.

Shared Pots in A3 and A4

To start off our year, we prepared our shared pots with a partner. The first step was to put soil into our pots. We divided our pot into thirds using sticks to make it easier to plant our seeds.

We planted marigold, radish and carrot seeds into each third and then planted some beetroot seeds too. Part of A3 and A4's morning routine is to water their shared pot. It is exciting discover seeds that germinated! What fantastic team players we have in A3 and A4!















The Premier's Reading Challenge is a literacy engagement program that was introduced by the Premier in 2004 to:

- Encourage students to read more books and enjoy reading
- Improve literacy levels.

The Challenge requires students to read 12 books between the beginning of the school year and 6th September.



The Benefits of students participating in the Challenge include:

- Raising the profile of reading and literacy in schools
- Giving students a focus for their reading
- Encouraging students to enjoy reading and read more books
- Encouraging students to participate by being challenged
- Offering incentives for reluctant readers
- Building self-esteem, pride, school unity and a sense of achievement among students
- Increasing the involvement of parents in their child's reading
- Increasing the number of library books borrowed
- Contributing to increased literacy levels

Teachers will be recording any books you're your child reads. Awards are given out in term 4.

Scholastic Book club

We run the Scholastic Book club twice per term. Your child will receive a book club catalogue, from which you are able to make purchases.

Orders can be placed directly online using the Scholastic LOOP system, or you can fill in the order form and pay cash or card at the front office.

Please note the final date for each issue, and make sure your orders are in by the due date.

The school receives 15% of sales back, which enables us to purchase more valuable items for the school.

So Many Options

At PNPS students have a variety of way in which they can extend themselves beyond their classroom. From electives to personal projects, sports to media – our students can avail themselves of a range of opportunities.

Choir

This year, for year 5 and 6 students we have recommenced our involvement in the Primary Schools Music Festival (Choir) and begun working toward the concert series in

in this group work to build their own capacity and are regularly checked for their achievements which they are able to share with others. We often draw on this expertise when building groups for our conferences.
