From the Principal's Desk

SPORTS DAY

On <u>Thursday the 28th of March</u>, we will be holding our annual Sport's Day event and are welcoming all families to attend. Students will need to begin the school day in their classroom to complete daily admin tasks. At 9:10am classes will move to the gym, where we will have an official opening of the event. Shortly after, we will commence the activity rotations. In the afternoon we will announce this year's sports day winner and after a short recess break, invite all students to participate in the colour run. A white T shirt will be needed for the colour run, these can be purchased cheaply from Kmart, best and Less for around \$5.

Parents are welcome to come along to the day.

Lunch Orders and Coffee Van:

This year **Subway lunches** will be available to order via the QKR App. If you would also like to place a Subway order for yourself and younger siblings, do it under your child's name and family lunches will be delivered to your child's classroom. There will also be a **coffee van** available on the day to purchase coffee and other drinks.

Colour Run:

This is always lots of fun, however, does get a little messy! To participate, we ask that students wear a plain white t-shirt (please be mindful that the colour will not come out). We also recommend bringing a change of clothes for afterwards or a towel for your car seats.

Early Dismissal:

School will finish at 2:15pm and students will need to meet their classroom teacher at the agreed location (teachers will SEESAW you the meeting point) after the colour run to be formally dismissed.


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Year 1/2s M Design Thinking Project M


